



THE ROTUNDA REFURBISHMENT

Over the past month or so, our Rotunda has been going through a “spruce-up”, thanks to our multi-skilled volunteer **Mal Longton** (pictured at right). Rotting timbers on struts, seats and lattice have been replaced and the floor pressure-hosed ready for Mal to lay new tiles.

The Rotunda was built in 1997. It began from a suggestion by a few local people, and businesswoman Deborah Law held a musical evening to start the fundraising. More local money was donated and the fund grew. The Garden club thought it would take 5 years to raise enough money but a grant of \$4,000 was received from the Australian Open Garden Scheme which then enabled the Club to purchase the Rotunda. Volunteers cleared an area for it to be built and under the guidance of Garden Club President **Mike Bell** and the Gardens Curator **Bill Haseler**, the work was done.



Over the years, the Rotunda has been a popular venue for weddings and other events and is an important feature of the Gardens. Positioned at the back of our Gardens, the setting is tranquil with a glorious elevated aspect. It provides a delightful undercover resting spot for visitors, with the adjacent paved Rotunda Walk connecting it to the rest of the Gardens. Additional plantings of Lagerstroemias are planned, and dwarf Agapanthus are to be continued around the edges of the pathways in front of the Rotunda.

Challenges!

The **Azaleas** had mealy bug again after being severely pruned and treated successfully last year.

Their response and growth had been wonderful, so this latest attack was so disappointing. I squashed as many as I possibly could, then treated the soil with ant bait as they apparently can be carriers and sprayed with white oil. Early days for results and all this rain is not good but fingers crossed. I'll repeat again in three weeks.

FUNGI AT THE GARDENS **Aseroe rubra**, commonly known as the anemone stinkhom, was spotted in our Succulent Garden. Common and widespread, this fungus is recognizable for its foul odour of carrion and its sea anemone shape when mature. It attracts flies, which spread its spores.

It begins as a partly buried whitish egg-shaped structure 3 cm in diameter, which bursts open as a hollow white stalk with reddish arms and grows to a height of 10 cm. It matures into a reddish star-shaped structure with six to ten arms. The top of the fungus is covered with dark olive-brown slime which smells of rotting meat.
